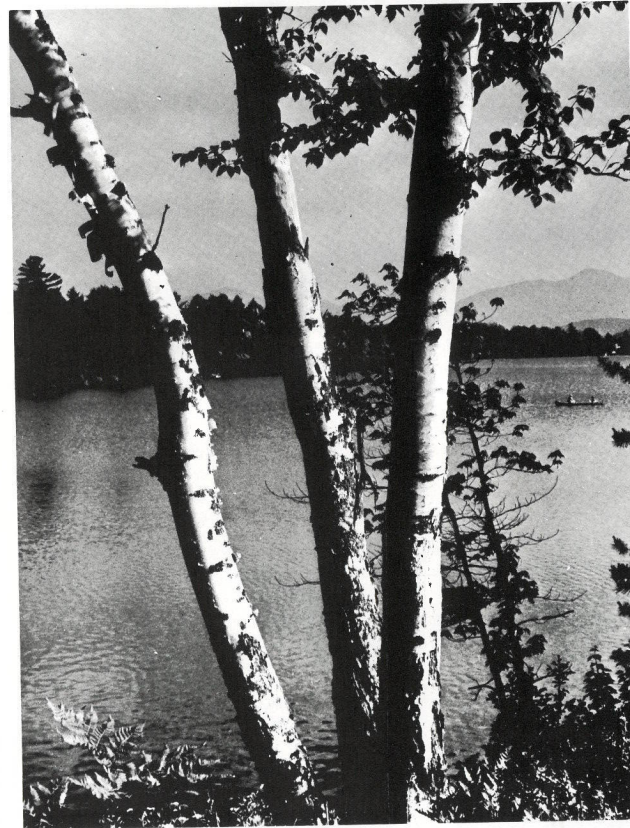

### HE SHALL BE LIKE A TREE.

Of all the living things, trees are the largest and most enduring. Since creation, they have been for the service of mankind. Trees have had a special place in the history of man.

First we find two special trees in the Garden of Eden — the Tree of Life and the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil. It was from the branches of the Tree of Knowledge that sin entered the world.

Noah was told to make an ark from the gopher tree to save his family. Abraham entertained angels under a tree. Joseph was called the "fruitful bough with his branches running over the wall." God talked to Moses in the burning bush and gave him a rod of the almond tree as a symbol of his authority. The ark of the tabernacle was made of wood from the shittim tree and it represented God's throne. The gates of the city of Gaza, the arrows of Jonathan and Haman's gallows were all made of wood from trees.

All through the history of the Old Testament into the New Testament, trees continue to tell their story. Jesus saw Nathanael under the fig tree. Zacchaeus saw Jesus by climbing a tree. The children waved palm branches as Jesus rode into Jerusalem, and from beneath the old olive trees Jesus was taken, condemned and then crucified upon a cross made from a tree.

John ends the story of sacred history by saying, "And He shewed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb. In the midst of the street of it and on either side of the river was there the tree of life, which bare twelve manner of fruits and yielded her fruit every month, and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations." ## A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Every person on earth has a rendezvous with the coming King of Kings and Lord of Lords. And He is coming in our day, in this generation. As to the signs of His coming we are well informed.

The Blessed Christ clearly stated the cataclysmic events that would precede His return. Many of these signs are listed in the Gospel of Saint Matthew, chapter twenty-four and in Saint Luke, chapter twenty-one. Here Christ states that there will be "wars, famines, pestilences and earthquakes" to name only a few. These events are taking place with shocking rapidity before our very eyes.

Let us take note of their fulfillment. More people have been killed in wars in this century than in all past history. The record shows that there have been more earthquakes from 1970 to 1980 than from any other period of time. As for pestilences, think of the Mediterranean fruitfly and the pine beetle that has destroyed vast forests. The International Environmentalists frantically declare that by 1986 most of the natural resources of the world will be exhausted. They believe there will be a bloody battle among the nations for what is left.

Some of us remember the Cuban Missile Crisis when President John Kennedy sent a message to the Russians to remove their missiles from Cuba and not to bring in any additional ones. And how the Russian fleet came over the North Atlantic loaded with new ones, reached the spot marked for their destruction by the U.S. military, circled and returned to their home ports. Why did they do this? In the Yom Kippur Crisis when Russia notified President Nixon that they were sending three thousand paratroopers to stabilize the Middle East, they were warned that the full force of the US military would meet them. The answer to their change in plans is found in Revelation 7:1-3. God commanded His angels to hold the winds of war to allow a little more time for His servants to prepare for His coming.

About one hundred years ago a famous Jewish rabbi had a vision. He said, "When the Russian fleet crosses the Dardanelles from the Black Sea into the Mediterranean Sea, every Jew should put on his Sabbath robe and get ready to meet the Messiah." The Russian government now has an agreement with Turkey, owners of this area, and the Russian fleet is moving freely through this area.

In 1869 a French scientist said, "I foresee that when man knows what the atom is, then the God of Heaven will come down with His big ring of keys and say, 'Gentlemen, it is closing time'." This is where we are this hour. "Look up; lift up your heads for your redemption draweth nigh." Let us cherish the promise of the Blessed Christ in Saint John 14:1-3. Our hearts need not be troubled. We can be ready for He is coming for us and for those for whom we have lovingly labored.

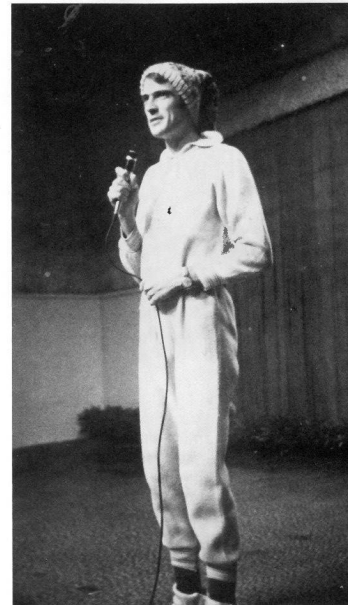

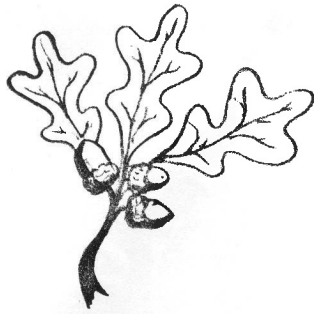

Mrs. Knecht was greatly loved by all. We look forward to meeting her in the great reunion under the tree of life in heaven.





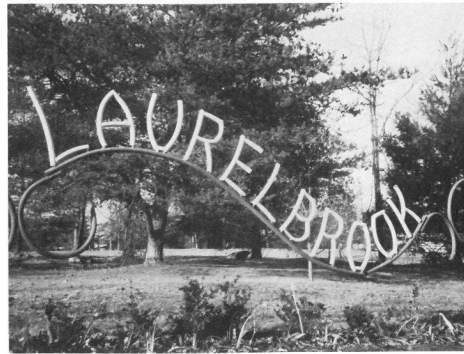
