## HARVEST FESTIVAL

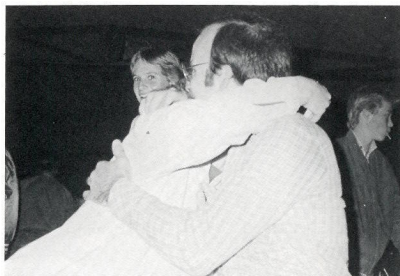

### WHAT IS THE ADVANCED STUDENT PROGRAM?

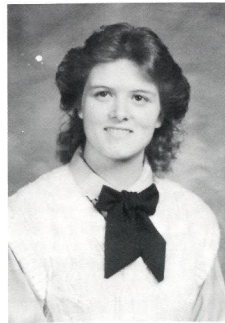
