

A DAY AT





Here at Laurelbrook Academy the students are involved in many different activities during the day. Each day holds new and exciting experiences which help in the molding of their characters. It is the goal of the staff here at Laurelbrook to have every student reach their full potential that we may all meet in heaven together.

The day starts off with morning worship in the dorms. There some of the students are able to participate by leading song service or planning worship themselves. Everyone can join in the singing of hymns.

Each student can try out for choir and chorale. There are also other musical groups that the students are involved in like band and male chorus. Some take instrument or voice lessons. The musical groups often perform here at Laurelbrook and they also go on trips to different churches.

Often when sharp, stinging words were spoken, often when the atmosphere about Him was heavy with gloom, with dissatisfaction, distrust, or oppressive fear, was heard His song of faith and holy cheer." During the holidays, the students enjoy special suppers. This is an enjoyable time for those who are not able to be at home. The food is made special and the cafeteria is decorated for this time of year.

Some nights there is worship in the dorms, but Tuesday night there is prayer meeting in the church and on Wednesday night the students and some staff meet in the auditorium for chapel.

WHAT LAURELBROOK . . .

SPIRITUAL

Laurelbrook places a strong emphasis on spiritual activities. Upholding the Christian standards of the Seventh-day Adventist Church is considered a matter of definite importance.

Laurelbrook was established to train young people to go out and finish the Lord's work and prepare people for Christ's second coming. The short time students spend here is used to prepare them for a place in God's work here and in heaven.

Students from Laurelbrook are often involved in missionary endeavors. Laurelbrook staff and students have helped build and sponsor a mission station in Belize, C.A., and work in the Dominican Republic. In the past ten years, over 100 students from Laurelbrook have helped on mission projects in Central America, Africa, and the Far East.

There are many Laurelbrook graduates serving around the world as ministers, doctors, nurses, teachers, and faithful laymen. This helps us better understand the statement from one of our favorite authors that when God's plan of education is put into practice the results testify of its author.









ACADEMICS

In the academic area, Laurelbrook has three programs - college entrance, general high school, and vocational high school.

The education provided at Laurelbrook is balanced by combining practical learning programs with math, science, English, etc.

In the book **Education** we read, "True education . . . is the harmonious development of the physical, the mental, and the spiritual powers. It prepares the student for the joy of service in this world and for the higher joy of wider service in the world to come." Education p.13 It is the desire of Laurelbrook that the students going from here will be able to serve God and have the joy that this provides.

SOCIAL

Training in social activities is an important part of life. At Laurelbrook, group activities provide times to socialize among the other students. Recreation and hikes each week provide exercise and fun for students and staff.

There are many special activities such as banquets, picnics, and class activities that give students time to get to know each other.

Laurelbrook encourages group activities so that students get to know each other without the trials and perplexities of exclusive boy/girl friendships. This also gives opportunity for students to let Christ's love shine in their associations with each other.





VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Practical training in everyday duties is an important part of Laurelbrook's education. The students have a wide variety of places where they can work to train in various skills.

The nursing home and farm work in conjunction with the school to provide over 20 areas of vocational training; examples of these include nurse's aide, dietary, construction, and auto mechanics. Each student spends a portion of the day working in one of these areas.

It is Laurelbrook's goal that the young people learn to do the job which they are sent to do and do it thoroughly and cheerfully just as Jesus did while on this earth.
