


## **Campus Improvements**





## **EASEA Mission Trip**



The trip to Guyana was awesome. The people there are very nice. They seem to be happy even when they have so little. It's pretty cool to see how happy they are with the little things they have. Their church services show the joy they have in Jesus. It is lively and powerful and made me think of the church in the disciples' time, a family of Christians.

Our project was the boys' dorm at KMA. All the boys and occasionally some of the girls worked on this building's construction throughout their threeweek stay at Kimbia. 



#### **How Did We Produce This Yearbook?**

Our yearbook production this year (2004) began with the decision to publish the yearbook on our own with a special type of cover manufactured for us. Our yearbook costs were mounting and doing it ourselves seemed

cover manufactured for us. Our yearbook costs were mounting and doing it ourselves seemed to be a good way to finally balance yearbook income with yearbook expenses. We saved money this first year but did not quite balance income with expenses due to equipment.

To begin with, a list of all pages together with the subject of each page (the ladder diagram) was prepared in the spring of 2003 by the outgoing yearbook staff. Before the ladder diagram was finalized, Chuck Hess (the institution's president) and Wanda Sarr (academy principal) were invited to give their comments on the proposed list.

In June, we had a computer custom-built by NCITE, a firm in Dayton, Tennessee. Specifications included a 2.4 gigahertz processor, 512 Meg of RAM, a DVD drive, a CD-RW drive, a 17-inch monitor, a Zip drive, a 3.5 floppy drive, and several USB ports. Windows 2000, Adobe Pagemaker 6.5, and Adobe Photoshop 5.5 along with several other programs were loaded onto the computer. A Hewlitt-Packard 2300 Laserjet printer was also ordered from the same firm.



During the summer months, ten pages with their accompanying pictures were prepared. As each page was begun, a folder was created for that page. Pictures and the Pagemaker file were placed in this folder. Except for the dedication pages, all folders were

initially kept on a special section of the school's computer system and later copied to a special section of the new computer for final checking and printing. During this final checking, the pictures were converted from color to black and white, links were checked, and the page proofread at least two to three times by various staff and student personnel (mistakes did occur). A test page was printed for each file and placed in a "page ready" folder.

As the school year began, the list of staff members was finalized and trained as needed. The class was scheduled to meet once a week for about 1 1/2 hours on Monday evening after worship. Except for emer-

gencies, this was basically all the time that was needed (photographers worked outside the class period to take pictures). The staff list was limited to ten.

The first 9-weeks of the year, the staff did about 35 pages, the second 9-weeks

about 33 pages. The rest of the pages were finished by April. During this time, the cover was designed by a senior staff member. In January, the covers were

ordered from ChannelBind (www.channelbind.com), a Xerox company specializing in a metal channel binding system that holds as well as a regular sewn cover (see the photo to the left). Cost per cover when 125 were ordered came to \$7.50 each.

Meanwhile the staff, sponsors, and Chuck Hess settled on the type of paper to use. 28-lb.(98 brightness) paper was ordered. A contrasting 28-lb. cream-colored paper was purchased from a Chattanooga paper company. This particular decision was to be one of our biggest headaches. The regular white paper was rated for "toner-based processes" but not specifically for laser printers.

Production began with 125 copies of each finished page. Collating was done as work proceeded, initially by the sponsor and later on by the staff members. Initially, there were problems with toner marks on the back of the first side after the second side was run if a sheet of ordinary 20-loffice paper was not run in between each of the page runs. After the work was there-fourths done

and a page with a very heavy background was run, toner marks started appearing during the page runs themselves. After NCITE technicians had cleaned the printer once or twice and Hewlitt-Packard was consulted about four times, it was determined that an HP Laseriet 24-lb. paper specifically manufactured for two-sided printing would have to be used.

The final pages were run in March and early April, and the binding began. The binding machine from ChannelBind had been purchased in November at a cost of \$1299. Binding was relatively easy once the process was mastered, and books that had a problem could be unbound and rebound up to three times. Naturally, rebinding was done as little as nossible.

In May, the yearbook was presented to the school, and Camelia (the person it was dedicated to) enjoyed the presentation immensely. By then, the whole process had begun again for the 2005 yearbook with a ladder diagram being drawn up and approved and staff members training on Pagemaker, Photoshop, and the yearbook digital camera.


