I am glad that Dagmar has come to Laurelbrook because she always thinks about others. She has been a very good example for all of the students.













As woodsmen know, sometimes it is hard to accurately measure a tree until it is flat on the ground. It is often equally hard to appreciate a person until he or she is gone. The passing of Patricia Seibert James left an empty spot on the Laurelbrook campus. Only now can we measure what she did for people.

Pat was many things – head dietician at the Laurelbrook Nursing Home, a dedicated home economics teacher, a loving wife, and a delightful person who dearly loved her Heavenly Father and her co-workers and students. In over twenty years on the Laurelbrook campus, she enriched everyone's life by her cheerfulness, kindness, music, and hard work.

She was born into a military family in Covington, Kentucky and graduated from Singapore Academy and from Southern Missionary College near Chattanooga, Tennessee (now Southern Adventist University) with a degree in dietary management. She worked at Adventist hospitals in Kettering, Ohio and Madison, Tennessee. At Madison, she met her first husband – Martin Seibert – and married him. Eventually, they went to live and work in Oregon. The couple welcomed Lori into their home.



This past summer, she married Buster James, and they began a new life together in the Laurelbrook dwelling where she had spent so many years.

She died in Memorial Hospital December 31, 2005. Funeral services were held on January 3, 2006 in the Laurelbrook church with Pastor Larry Owens of the Laurelbrook Seventh-day Adventist Church and Pastor Bob Mix of the Standifier Gap Seventh-day Adventist Church presiding. Vanderwall Funeral Home in Dayton was in charge of the funeral arrangements. Pat is buried in the Laurelbrook Cemetery.

What more can be said of her dedicated life? Here are a few comments from the audience at the funeral service.

 Judy Frechette, fellow staff member and cook, noted that Pat was very careful to get her studying done when taking a course and that she was patient with questions from those she was training.

2. She had a sense of humor. Pastor Owens said that her husband Buster wanted him to tell about the time Pat was working at Sears. Someone brought in a broken chainsaw and said it wouldn't run. "Did you take it for a walk?" she replied.

#### **Tribute to Donald Oliver Brenneman**

December 4, 1920 - October 20, 2005

In his nearly 85 years, Donald Oliver Brenneman was many things - a carpenter, mapmaker, year-book ad salesman, and plant manager. He was a father to two children - Jim, a Laurelbrook teacher, and Patricia, a computer software engineer in California. He also had three grandchildren - Annette, a Certified Nursing Assistant; Donnie, who works for Majestic Stone Company on Dayton Mountain; and Theresa, a

ing the state of Tennessee.

Majestic Stone Company on Dayton Mountain; and Theresa, a student at a local college in California. He was also a great-grand-father to one great-grandchild - Jonathan, a first grader at Hixson Elementary school in Chattanooga. His wide ranging career took him from Oklahoma to Tunisia to Maryland to Tennessee.

Born December 4, 1920 in Pawnee, Oklahoma, he was the oldest of four born to Oliver Quincy Brenneman and his wife Lola Hamilton. After graduating from Newton's high school in 1935, he did odd jobs such as pin setting at a bowling alley; he also worked with his father constructing houses. With war raging, he got a job working for the Cessna Aircraft Company in Wichita. In 1942, he joined the U.S. Army Air Force, eventually becoming a map maker.

In 1946, he got a job making maps for the U.S. Geological Survey at its headquarters in Washington, D.C. Over 13 years, he mapped much of the United States, includ-

When his son Jim was in the seventh grade, Pastor John Loor, the elementary school's Week of Prayer speaker, heard his son say that he wished that his father would give his heart to Christ. Pastor Loor called on Donald, and Donald gave his heart to the Lord. He and his son were baptized together in the Takoma Park Seventh-day Adventist Church across from General Conference headquarters.

In 1960, with much of the mapmaking work shifting to computers, he took a job as assistant general manager and plant manager with the Sanborn Spring Company, a company his brother-in-law Robert Sanborn owned and operated near Collegedale, Tennessee.

In 1968 his brother-in-law sold the company to a Connecticut firm. Sanborn Spring Company became Newcomb Spring Company of Tennessee, and he became the general manager. But after two years the company let him go. By this time, they

were becoming just another commercial concern and not a source of employment for Southern students.

After several months looking for work, he was hired by Southern as one of their maintenance men, primarily working in

construction as a carpenter. He worked for the college maintenance department for fifteen years until his retirement in 1985.

Three years later he and his wife Celia May moved to Dayton Mountain to be near their son Jim and his family. His wife Celia May slid into dementia five years later and eventually went to the Laurelbrook Nursing Home.

In retirement, he enjoyed traveling, **getting yearbook ads for the Laurelbrook** *Afterglow*, and watching sports and eating pizza with his grandson Donnie, as well as helping others when he could. He loved to help others, sometimes to his own detriment.

His life was fatally shattered when an elderly lady turned in front of him as he drove down Dayton Mountain on Highway 30 on October 4th. The impact broke his neck and may have caused other injuries. After two and a half weeks in the Shock-Trauma ICU at Erlanger Hospital in Chattanooga, he died.

In his nearly 85 years in wide-ranging careers, Donald Oliver Brenneman helped improve the world in which he lived. The world was different when he ended his tasks on earth.


